

Finances and Donations

The year 2014 was another good year financially for MDIA. Product sales, memberships, donations, and even telescope revenue allow MDIA to make ongoing contributions to Mount Diablo State Park. Because MDIA is an all-volunteer organization, only 5% of our annual revenue is spent on administrative expense.

MDIA contributions to the park for 2014 were almost \$65,000 and included funding for the following projects:

- Trail maintenance
- The park aide at the Summit Visitor Center
- Refurbishing the Macedo Ranch Staging Area restrooms
- Refurbishing the Live Oak Campground restrooms
- Refurbishing the Campfire Center at Live Oak Campground
- Supplies for the replacement of the Dan Cook Canyon Bridge
- Purchase of new vests for docents and hike leaders
- MDIA student intern
- School and Junior Ranger programs
- Small equipment purchases for the park
- Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center displays
- Interpretive displays


Sales of T-shirts, hats, bike jerseys, books, publications, hiking maps, and even animal puppets provide funding for many ongoing projects. The majority of sales are made at the Summit Visitor Center, but various publications and merchandise are also sold at the Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center, at park entrance stations, by mail order, and online via the MDIA.org website.

The remainder of MDIA's revenue comes primarily from memberships and donations. Annual memberships provide the organization with ongoing support and a pool of potential volunteers and others who wish to support our beautiful mountain. 

EDUCATION AND JUNIOR RANGER PROGRAMS

Every year, Mount Diablo State Park welcomes hundreds of students on school field trips. Volunteers from MDIA assist with hosting these school tours and other educational programs such as scout outings. In 2014, MDIA co-sponsored a program on the Morgan Fire with Lindsay Wildlife Museum.

MDIA continued in 2014 as the co-sponsor of the park's Junior Ranger Program. This program, for kids 7 to 12 years of age, includes a variety of offerings. The beginning Junior Ranger Program is a five-session program on topics such as geology, plants, animals, California Native

Americans, prehistoric times, and the history of Mount Diablo. Participants earn weekly awards, and a Junior Rangers Badge and Certificate at completion.

Junior Ranger II and other advanced programs focus on more in-depth, handson activities and more challenging hikes. For example, during 2014, a program was offered on California Native Americans and several different park hikes.

In 2014, MDIA/Volunteers In Park (VIP) docents led 101 hikes, 7 Summit programs, and 5 campfire events in the park for the general public, students, and private groups.

Along with the fire recovery hikes, MDIA led wildflower and geology tours, summer night hikes, and the ever-popular tarantula treks. The highlight was "Celebrate on the Mountain" the weekend of April 26 and 27, during which the 40th anniversary of the Mount Diablo Interpretive Association and the 150th anniversary of the California State Parks System were celebrated. MDIA led 15 hikes and presented various displays at the Lower Summit, Juniper Campground/Diablo Valley Overlook, Rock City, and Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center.

He spent two months working on map design with Mike Woodring. Daniel also helped with organized hikes, accompanying the hikers and answering questions. MEMBERSHIP

At the end of 2014, MDIA had 329 memberships:

- 62 Life Memberships
- 27 Contributing Memberships
- 43 Family Memberships
- 26 Individual Memberships
- 167 Senior Memberships
- 1 Student Membership
- 3 Associate Memberships

In 2014, 52 new members joined, and the renewal rate was approximately 85%. Thank you for your continued support of MDIA and Mount Diablo State Park.

MERCHANDISING

The year 2014 was another excellent merchandising year for MDIA, producing continued steady sales revenue for investment in Mount Diablo State Park.

Highlights included introducing these new products:

- A white version of the Mount Diablo bike jersey
- A new set of bird, wildflower, and butterfly guides that have proven to be very popular

MDIA also sold seven MDIA publications wholesale to 12 retailers: Trail Map of Mount Diablo State Park, Mount Diablo—The Extraordinary Life and Landscapes of a California Treasure, The Mount Diablo Guide, Mountain Lore, Common Birds of Mount Diablo, Mt. Diablo Wildflowers, and Trees and Shrubs of Mount Diablo.

MITCHELL CANYON VISITOR CENTER

Owned and operated by Mount Diablo State Park, the Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center (MCVC) is the cornerstone of the Mitchell Canyon Staging Area. This staging area is a key backcountry starting point at the park for hiking, biking, and equestrian pursuits. The MCVC provides displays on park attractions, natural history, and other topics. It is the main source of hike information for many visitors.

MDIA provides volunteers who staff the MCVC, set up displays, manage merchandise sales, and provide regular housekeeping and most of the facility's maintenance. During 2014, MDIA members upgraded exhibits and added new features at the MCVC. An informative exhibit was created by Leslie Contreras and Karen Barrett on the decomposition of trash items left in the park. A flat screen monitor was added with a slideshow overview of flora and park volunteering for visitors to enjoy.

PARK DOCENTS

Members of MDIA play an important role at the park as docents under the Volunteers in Parks Program. Volunteer docents provide assistance to visitors at the Summit Visitor Center, at the Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center (MCVC), as roving trail docents, and as hike leaders.

During 2014, park docents volunteered thousands of hours and hosted nearly 9,200 visitors at the MCVC, another excellent year. Docents helped hundreds more visitors at the Summit Visitor Center and on the trails, reported trail and park upkeep issues, and responded to visitors in need of assistance. They also hosted a variety of geology, tarantula, wildflower, and family hikes.

Naturalist and docent Michael Marchiano organized and led a well-attended series of programs to help educate park docents. In addition, docent/writer Staci Hobbet launched a weekly Docent News Alert e-newsletter to keep docents up-to-date on the latest happenings in the park.

A small group of docents help staff the park entrance stations where they collect park entrance fees and provide visitor information. Of particular note, in addition to everything else, park docents were critical volunteers during 2014 special events: Earth Day, the 150th Anniversary of California State Parks, and the Amgen Tour of California Bike Race.

PARK MAINTENANCE

The Volunteer Maintenance Group (VMG) completed three major restoration projects and several smaller maintenance projects this year. At the Live Oak Campground, the restrooms were repaired and repainted. In addition, the campfire center was completely restored, including the installation of new decking, redwood benches, and a projector table. At the Macedo Ranch Staging Area, the VMG restored the restrooms with new roofing, gutters, lighting, and heavy-duty doors that will keep birds from nesting inside.

Another small team of dedicated volunteers spent hundreds of hours artfully placing and creating a series of stone steps in Rock City.

PUBLICATIONS

In 2014, MDIA continued to publish the park's complimentary *Mount Diablo Review* newsletter twice a year for park visitors. MDIA also published the *Mountain News* newsletter for MDIA members in spring and fall. With the spring 2014 issue, we bid a fond farewell to Frank Valle-Riestra's ever-popular "Frank's Favorite Hikes" feature in the *Mountain News*.

To help publicize MDIA, explain its mission and roles, and solicit new members, a new, full-color MDIA membership application brochure was designed and printed.

Work continued on a new publication, Hiker's Guide to Mount Diablo State Park. Photos were solicited and chosen for inclusion, maps and profiles were created, and the hike descriptions were reviewed and refined. Many volunteers have devoted an enormous amount of time and effort into creating this publication to enhance visitors' enjoyment of the park.

WEBSITE

The MDIA website, MDIA.org, continues to supply park visitors with important information, announcements of new interpretive features, and an updated calendar of docent-guided hikes on the Mountain. With the continuation of the drought, important announcements kept visitors alerted to restroom closures and the park's water supply. In addition, a new audio tour of the Rock City area and park history was added. This year MDIA advertised a record number of wildflower, tarantula, and other guided hikes on the Mountain.

TRASH REMOVAL & HABITAT RESTORATION

Over 15 years ago, MDIA and Volunteers In Park Program (VIPP) volunteers along with Park management (Larry Ferri and Dave Matthews) initially identified and documented 113 Trash Removal Project (TRP) cleanup sites in the park. The group officially began work on those sites on May 20, 2001. To date, 78 sites have been cleaned up and closed out in the park.

In 2014, 1,310 volunteer hours were devoted to the TRP initiative in Mount Diablo State Park, for a total of 28,747 hours since 2001. TRP volunteers removed for recycling or reuse in the park the following (not including countless trash bags of bottles, cans, papers, etc.):

2015 Goals and Objectives

- Develop interpretive displays to address the cultural history of the park, specifically early California Native Americans, and interpret existing Mount Diablo resources through that lens.
- Schedule and lead a variety of hikes in the park for the general public, students, and private groups as requested.
- Create and present free interpretive programs to the general public at the Summit Visitor Center, Mitchell Canyon Visitor Center, and Live Oak Campground amphitheater.
- Provide venues for docents to interact with one another and park staff, and foster more learning opportunities, such as an in-service training program.
- Complete and publish the Hiker's Guide to Mount Diablo State Park.
- Perform additional deferred park maintenance repairs, such as restroom restorations, electrical upgrades to entrance stations, and potential upgrades to buildings at Mitchell Canyon.
- Provide funding as necessary to staff the Summit Visitor Center.
- Seek new outreach venues, and encourage and train more MDIA members to staff outreach events.
- Join and participate with other related organizations on behalf of, and to represent, MDIA.
- Update the MDIA Board of Directors' Handbook and document committee policies and procedures.
- Continue to advertise docent-guided hikes and other related park events and announcements on the MDIA website event calendar and home page.
- Publish periodic email newsletters to the MDIA email distribution list covering topics related to Mount Diablo State Park and MDIA.
- Streamline inventory control measures and implement a more efficient methodology to fulfill visitor merchandise requests.
